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PREFACE

History of ANSA.

ANSA originated as result of fishing developments following the war, an increasing number of anglers started using modern tackle mainly bait casting rods and reels imported from the U.S., for bass, barramundi and for surfcasting. Developments are reflected clearly in magazines of the period. (Outdoors was first published in 1948, Anglers Digest in 1950).

There was an increasing recognition that the sporting value of many Australian species was not reflected in existing organisations.

From 1960 forward, a number of people had thought of the idea of a new sportfishing organisation. I do not know who was "first" to think of it but I do know that it was discussed for quite a few years by Sydney anglers and people such as myself - a country boy. I can put a finger on one such discussion, held on the roadside just south of Kiama, between myself, Jack Erskine and Ed Pratt. That was January 1964 during my first round Australia trip. I had started my exploration of Australian fishing on July 1 1963. The next couple of years, after repeated visits, I had realised that North Queensland offered the most potential for a fishing future. Others such as George Bransford had decided the same way.

I built my home in Cardwell in 1966, with the bricklaying being done by my friend Ed Pratt, who had moved north to Cairns about the same time. The ANSA concept was understood by a number of Cairns anglers, and I believe its success came because it reflected what was happening to Australian fishing. It could not have succeeded otherwise.

In February 1967 we formed the "Australian National Sportfishing Association" at a meeting in the old hall at Yorkey's Knob, just north of Cairns.

Within a few months a constitution had been drawn up and an account opened in the Cairns branch of the Bank of NSW in the name of the "Australian National Sportfishing Association" It is worth a mention that the late Wal Hardy was patron of that initial organisation.

Dick Lewers recorded that the NSW group "got the message" of the Cairns movement and responded by forming what was then the NSW division of ANSA on Saturday August 12 1967.

Three months later, in November 1967, Jack Erskine and Clyde Kelton with three NSW sport fishermen from Wollongong, John Kettle, Peter Fuller, and Bill Ferguson visited North Queensland in a light plane. Discussions took place with the Cairns group and the accepted name of ANSA was endorsed by both groups. However, it had already become clear that the NSW fraternity would not accept the Cairns constitution. Then, as now, State Divisions (branches) were more representative of regional interests. Accordingly, the Cairns ANSA group met on February 7 1968 and became instead the Cairns Sportfishing Club

At this time there was no Queensland Division as such, however Dick Lewers and the National Organisation have always recognised that the Cairns Sportfishing Club has the unique distinction of being the first ANSA club.

The first NSW ANSA club was the St.George Sportfishing club, which had its first general meeting on November 13 1968. On December 13 1969 the first official body was formed as the "Australian National Sportfishing Association". The original A.N.S.A. badge design was selected from a competition published in "AUSTRALIAN SPORTFISHING", Summer edition 1969. The winning design was submitted by John Renolds, Liverpool, NSW.

It was agreed to form the first record chart from the then existing Queensland and N.S.W. record charts. ANSA's first official Queensland division was formed on August 5 1970 with only three clubs - Cairns, Maryborough, and Cardwell, with a State total of 150 members.

So far as ANSA goes the story since has been one of steady growth. We now have more than 200 clubs Nation wide. We are represented on every State fishing council, at Federal level, and on IGFA. Looking back we can see that the hassles over constitutions and rules, even point scores, were part of the process of developing sportfishing on a truly representative and wholly Australian basis.

One of the nicest thoughts is that many of those people who contributed to the forming of the association are still with us today.

National Executive Director's Report (Acting Chairman)

Its great to see life back to normal for most of us but it is still going to take some time before we fully recover from the impacts of extreme weather, pandemics and a global financial crisis which have plagued the nation over recent years.

On reviewing the 2022/23 year it is regrettable but understandable that many of our longstanding clubs have not been able to weather the combination of these unfortunate events. This is not a problem unique to any one state as most state branches of ANSA are experiencing similar challenges as are other recreational fishing peak bodies. Hopefully there will be opportunities to bring these clubs back into the ANSA fold now that the popularity of recreational fishing has bounced back and the hardships of the past few years now seemingly behind us.

ANSA National and most branches did concessionally reduce their membership fees to assist clubs cope with Covid financial impacts but this concession ended last year. The National Executive is mindful that some clubs and branches are still doing it tough and stand ready to do whatever it can to assist branches and clubs over these challenging times.

Fortunately our opportunities to go fishing and the general state of our fisheries have not been unduly affected by these events and by all accounts the fishing tackle, boating and camping trade sectors are experiencing a boom time with so many of us wanting to spend more leisure time outdoors with family and friends enjoying the healthy life style of being at one with nature.

According to the recently released "National Social and Economic Survey of Recreational Fishers" around one in five Australians goes fishing at least once a year. In fact the number of people who go fishing has increased from around 3.4 mill in 1999/2000 to 4.2 mill over 2020. Australians spend an estimated 28 million days fishing each year and contribute over \$11 billion to the national economy and keep over 100,000 in jobs. From a social licence perspective 61% of all Australians felt recreational fishing was a very acceptable activity and another 8.1% found it moderately acceptable. Only 8.2% felt it was unacceptable and another 12.7% were unsure.

Against this background of more recreational fishing it is surprising that the number of record and master claims and meritorious captures submitted over 2022/23 continues to decline and only a very small number of members are submitting claims. Maybe it's just that record captures are harder to make these days or maybe some species are more elusive and tighter fishing regulations are all having an impact - or is it more than that. This is an issue ANSA National and the Branch network need to have a think about.

The challenge for ANSA across the nation is to continue on its pathway of rebuilding club and member numbers and to provide more appeal to existing and potential members.

There is no quick fix or silver bullet for making this happen but the opportunities are obviously there and we need to think outside the box as to how we react to these opportunities, in particular to generate more appeal to the younger generation of recreational fishers of being part of an ANSA club.

Also given the social and economic value of recreational fishing to the nation and its member states it is evident that more recognition must be given to the sector by government at all levels and our value properly measured when making policy which impacts directly or indirectly upon recreational fishing. It is up to all of us as individuals to get this message across to all within the broad circle of government to give recreational fishers a fairer go.

Of current concerns nationally are proposals for offshore wind power generation and gas extraction and potential related impacts upon fishing access and the marine environment. The issue of fish pain and condemnation of capture and release practice and the use of live baits continue to build momentum and this level of extreme conservation is now expanding its focus to include commercial fishing, invertebrates and farming practices.

We need to be on guard to preserve and enhance our environmental social licence by doing more to better look after our marine environment. There are opportunities for ANSA members to get more involved with fish habitat rehabilitation activities with bodies such as Ozfish who are always looking for new partners to jointly undertake rehabilitation projects. This is great way to build on the social licence of recreational fishing and to make a positive and meaningful difference to our marine environment as well as interacting with like minded individuals who could be potential club members. An important date to keep aside is Gone Fishing Day usually held over the 2nd weekend of October. This is a national event conceived by the Australian Recreational Fishing Foundation (ARFF) and supported by most State Fishery agencies and the Tackle industry. Its worth throwing your weight behind this national annual event which has strong public support and presents a great opportunity to promote club fishing activities and advance the many social economic and health benefits of recreational fishing. This is another opportunity to promote your club and ANSA.

Financially, ANSA National is in a sound position. Our cash reserves did take a \$10k hit over the period of Covid and are now recovering as a consequence of the restoration of pre Covid membership fees. ANSA is budgeting to achieve a modest surplus of \$920 over the 2023/24 based on a slight increase in membership fee revenue and improved interest earnings on its term deposit. On the expenditure side we have built in a provision to cover the cost of a face to face meeting over 2024 and potential reprinting of the Rule Book. The National executive will endeavour to improve this surplus by lifting revenue and containing expenses where possible.

Finally I would take this opportunity to acknowledge and express my gratitude for the support provided by my colleagues on the National executive and to those branch committee members and their affiliated club members who are the back bone of ANSA.

National Finance Director's Report

ANSA - AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL SPORTFISHING ASSOCIATION LTD ACN 063 293 514 FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

Financial statements for the financial year end 30 June 2023 together with comparative results for the preceding year are appended. The following points are highlighted:

- a) The Association traded at a surplus of \$5227 for the 2022/23 year. This was an improvement on the budgeted surplus of \$1200 and a turn around on the deficit of \$3966 incurred over 2021/22.
- b) Income over the 2022/23 year of \$14316 was ahead of budget forecast of \$11850. Member affiliation fees \$11747 were ahead of budget \$11000 and well ahead of fee revenue of \$4774 generated over 2021/22. This revenue improvement was due to cessation of the 50% membership fee concession provided over the Covid lockdown and a slight recovery in membership numbers. Bank interest of \$428 was well above budget \$50 due to the lift in deposit rates over the last qtr of 2022. Web advertising revenue \$220 was slightly below budget of \$300.and ANSA Ware sales of \$1921 were well above budget \$500.
- c) Expenditure over the 2022/23 year was \$9089 as compared to budget \$10650. Main variances to budget were savings on travel expenses \$0 (budget \$1000), conference fees \$0 (budget \$1000), ANSA Promotion \$0 (budget \$500), donations/tributes \$0 (budget \$200) and records/masters expenses \$40 (budget \$400).
- d) The Association at year end 30 June 2023 possessed total assets of \$91858 (\$86631@ 2022) consisting of cash at bank \$13774, term deposit \$72102, ANSA Ware stock on hand \$5585 and accrued but unpaid interest \$397. Overall the company had a net equity of \$91858 at 30 June 2023.
- e) A financial budget forecast for the 2023/24 year is attached. For the coming year the association is forecasting a surplus of \$920. This modest surplus is predicated on income for the coming year of \$16600 which is above last year's revenue of \$14316 mainly as a consequence of an ongoing recovery in membership numbers and a sustained appetite for ANSA Ware. Ongoing elevated interest rates on term deposits should generate some \$2800 over 2023/24 as compared to modest interest earnings over recent years. Expenditure of \$15680 is forecast for 2022/23 which is well above last year's spend of \$9089. Major expenses include \$4000 for travel and accomodation this expenditure relates to a proposed face to face meeting of the national executive and branch delegates sometime over the first half of 2024 no travel and accomodation expenditure has been incurred since 2019/20. A \$2000 allowance has been made for possible reprinting of the ANSA Rule book should this be necessary as a consequence of any rule changes that might arise out of the rule review to be conducted over 2023/24.

The executive will endeavour to improve on the projected surplus by lifting revenue and containing expenses wherever possible.

Review opinion on the financial report

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

This year we had only 8 Masters claims submitted compared to 14 Masters claims in 2021-22 and 23 claims in 2020-21. This decrease is slightly concerning and it would be great to turn it around and get back towards the 20 claim mark each year. This year I'm going to raise more awareness around the Masters process within our clubs and members, in the hope of boosting the claims up.

This year of the 8 Masters claims only Queensland (with 7) and South Australia (with 1) were represented. It's no surprise that Helen Johnson from Bundaberg Sportfishing Club scooped the pool yet again with 5 claims, followed by Nelson Philips, also from Bundaberg Sportfishing Club, with 2 claims and then Paul Wolfendale from Northern Districts Sportfishing Club had one claim.

Paul's Masters claim was for his 10 trophy length Bight Redfish / Nannygai. Nelson scored his first 10 trophy length Australian Bass and then followed it up with his 20 trophy length Australian Bass six months later. Well done on your achievements.

Helen Johnson scored her 50 trophy length Javelin Fish which is a great achievement. Without doubt, Helen must have been fishing hard for Saratoga this year and it shows in her Masters claims. Helen has claimed her 70, 80, 90 and then 100th trophy length Saratoga. The 70th was caught on 3rd of March 2022 and the milestone 100th was caught on the 27th of February 2023. What a fantastic achievement it is to reach 100 trophy length Saratoga and going through the records, I can not find anyone else who has reached a 100 of any species trophy length, so congratulations Helen on the milestone and I'm now looking forward to what is next on your list.

I always look forward to new claims coming through and seeing what people have achieved, so please get them through to me. I hope that we all have a great fishing year with plenty of Masters claims crossing my desk.



Something to really think about and appreciate the benefits and reasons why a fishing club is the way to go, even AI can't be wrong. I implore each one of you to reach out and bring a new member into the ANSA scene and help them enjoy their fishing a bit more, tell 'em, Chat GTP sent you.

Moving on from AI, on the advocacy side of the coin has also been well serviced with ANSA NSW making multiple submissions to all things fishing in NSW.

Every single ANSA NSW member, Club Committee member and State Executive member should be extremely honoured and gratified that a small 0.001% can be pivotal in swaying how the NSW and Federal Governments decide on all of the stakeholder's access to the land, water and resource.

On reviewing the past fishing year it is regrettable but understandable that many of our longstanding NSW clubs have not been able to weather the combination of these unfortunate events. Our affiliated club and membership numbers are currently sitting at 21 and 806 respectively which is a slight improvement on the numbers for the prior year but well short of where we were some 4 or 5 years ago when Branch club numbers hovered at around 40 and membership was around 1200.

This is not a problem unique to NSW as most state branches of ANSA are experiencing similar challenges as are other recreational fishing peak bodies. ANSA National and NSW Branch have concessionally reduced their membership fees over the past 3 years to assist clubs financially but this concession ended last year. The NSW Branch Committee stands ready to do whatever it can to assist clubs over these difficult times.

Fortunately our opportunities to go fishing and the general state of our fisheries have not been unduly affected by these events and by all accounts the fishing tackle, boating and camping trade sectors are experiencing a boom time with so many of us wanting to spend more leisure time outdoors with family and friends enjoying the healthy life style of being at one with nature.

According to the recently released "National Social and Economic Survey of Recreational Fishers" around one in five Australians goes fishing at least once a year. In fact the number of people who go fishing has increased from around 3.4 million in 1999/2000 to 4.2 million over 2020. Australians spend an estimated 28 million days fishing each year and contribute over \$11 billion to the national economy and keep over 100,000 in jobs. NSW and the ACT conjointly spend an estimated 10 million days fishing each year and generate \$4 bill for the national economy and carry 33,000 jobs. From a social licence perspective 61% of all Australians felt recreational fishing was a very acceptable activity and another 8.1% found it moderately acceptable. Only 8.2% felt it was unacceptable and another 12.7% were unsure.

The challenge for ANSA across the nation is to continue on its pathway of rebuilding club and member numbers. There is no quick fix or silver bullet for making this happen but the opportunities are obviously there and we need to think outside the box as to how we react to these opportunities, in particular to generate more appeal to the younger generation of recreational fishers of being part of a club. Also given the social and economic value of recreational fishing to the nation and its member states it is evident that more recognition must be given to the sector by government at all levels and our value properly measured when making policy which impacts directly or indirectly upon recreational fishing. It is up to all of us as individuals to get this message across to all within the broad circle of government.

Of current concern are proposals for offshore wind power generation and gas extraction. In this context it is pleasing that NSW DPI has stocked 67,000 juvenile Mulloway into the Georges River, 36,000 into the Hastings River and 23,000 into Lake Macquarie. We need to see more initiatives such as this to give mother nature a helping hand and likewise to also to improve our access to all waterways with the provision of better boating and fishing infrastructure across the state. With the recent changes to government at a Federal and State level the time is right for recreational fishers and the marine estate and environment to be given a fairer go.

There are also opportunities for ANSA members to get more involved with fish habitat rehabilitation activities with bodies such as Ozfish who are always looking for new partners to jointly undertake rehabilitation projects. This is great way to build on the social licence of recreational fishing and to make a positive and meaningful difference to our marine environment as well as interacting with like minded individuals who could be potential club members. This is why all of us should put our hands up to lead, build our clubs up and try and leave the fishery in a better way than we found it.

2023 ANSA National Annual Report



It's been another busy and prosperous year for ANSA QLD. Not only have we re-connected with clubs and re-invigorated several fishing and social events, but we've introduced several new initiatives. These initiatives have included a fantastic online platform for competitions and angling achievements, as well as a brand-new tagging and monitoring program.

Membership

Membership numbers fell by 8% in 2022/23. The majority of this decline in membership came from a reduction in short-term membership and a small decline in general membership.

This downward movement follows two consecutive years of increased membership numbers and as such QLD Sportfishers has no immediate concerns regarding membership retention over the short to medium term.

Events

QLD Sportfishers is proud to support our affiliated clubs through in-kind contributions, liability insurance and awards. Support provided this year included events such as, but not limited to, the North Qld Sportfishing Championships (Hinchinbrook SFC), the Tag-a-toga (Kingaroy SFC) and the Barcoo club's community fishing day.

In October 2022, QLD Sportfishers, with assistance from our hosts the Kingaroy Sportfishing club, held our annual Sportfishing Festival. The Boondooma Sportfishing Festival saw over 60 anglers attend the fishing and social activities. During the awards dinner annual champion anglers were presented with their awards, while Bundaberg SFC once again took out champion club.

In May 2022, the QLD Sportfishers Statewide Species Challenge was held. Congratulations to our winners, the Bundaberg club was well represented during the event and were rewarded by taking out the winning club award for the 3rd year running.




ANSA Qld Flyfishers

In 2022, following our annual AGM meeting at Boondooma Dam, a small group got together to form the ANSA QLD FLYFISHERS interest group. This group was set up on messenger and throughout the year our little group has now grown to 12. Members coming from ANSA Clubs across Qld. From this group we have run monthly competitions to challenge each other in the fine art of flyfishing, tying fly's and general chatter as to the different species we chase. From FNQ to the SE of Qld, freshwater, estuary to blue water. Resulting in some great captures, from the beginners to the more proficient members. Each month the winner of the previous challenge gets the choice for the next challenge.

Tagging Report

We had a great year tagging from all the clubs and tags have been put in far and wide. From the data gathered through the ANSA QLD website we have tagged 1694 fish from all parts of the state spread across 32 species which is a great effort and will give us in the next few years some great data on fish movements and growth rates. We have had 45 recaptures reported this year with some of those fish have traveled some distance from their initial capture point. One bass was recaptured nearly 27 kms away after 142 days out. The price of tags has risen dramatically over the last couple years with the spear/dart tags nearly \$2 per tag so thankfully our grant submission was successful.





Annual Recorders Report

Another season has passed with the 4 divisions of the <u>ALL TACKLE LENGTH ONLY DIVISIONS</u>, Sportfishing, Lure casting, Fly and Landbased. This season has seen <u>101</u> new Record claims from the various clubs, No Line Class Records were submitted for the season. With the inclusion of our Special Fly fishing group this year seen the most records come in from the Fly Division, Congratulation to those who chucked a bit of fur and feather around

ANSA South Australia Report

Membership this year has been a little down on the previous year with 202 members (-38 on the previous year) with 54 Juniors included in that figure (-16 on the previous year). We managed to have a new club, Country & Coast Anglers Association come on board but sadly we lost 2 clubs (Adrenaline Fishing Club and South Australian Sportfishing Association). I believe that the late Knut Gassmanis was holding SASA together and sadly the club folded not long after his death. We went from 8 associate clubs down to 7 this year. We're hoping for a bit of an uplift next year in our membership.

ANSA SA is an affiliate of South Australia's peak Body Recfish SA which is supported by ANSA members with some holding board positions as directors.

Recfish SA this year has taken over running the Reeling In Junior Ambassador's program and has run two clinics in the past 12 months, one in the Riverland and the other at Hope Valley reservoir, both of which were filled to capacity and were very successful. The Reeling In Juniors program was previously run by Lee Van Soest our ANSA SA president and it was her passion. Sadly, with the decline in her health, she had to pass the program on and Recfish SA was the best candidate.

Recfish SA, in conjunction with Greening Adelaide, (with many ANSA members taking part) organized a swap over program for yabbie nets exchanging the now illegal opera house nets for the new pyramid type. This saw 2000 nets swapped over which a pleasing outcome for all was involved.

It's been a busy year for Recfish SA with board members now sitting on many state government committees and advisory bodies.

You may be aware that we have had a severe decline in our snapper stocks over the past decade to the point that they are now a fully protected species in our gulf waters and on the west coast. The only place we can catch them is the South-East of the state, as science has shown that it is the same breeding stock as the Victorian snapper which seem to be in good numbers.

Canvassing PIRSA, Recfish SA has had the snapper limit for the South-East sector doubled for recreational fishers from one fish to two per day. The rest of the state remains closed for snapper fishing.

A 'snapback' program was presented, and well received by the state government, to get fishers sustainably fishing for snapper again once the closure has ended.

Talks have been held with local councils in the South-East refarding a native fish stocking program in the South-East of the state and talks are progressing well.

Boat ramps and fishing jetties around the state are an ongoing issue due to a lack of maintenance by Infrastructure SA and Recfish SA have been making various recommendations and this is ongoing.

Recreational fishing in South Australia has now been independently assessed as being worth in excess of one billion dollars to the south Australia economy, giving recreational fishers some clout when dealing with state government bodies. Recfish SA is now moving in the right direction and has the ears of many government bodies.

Seventy seven offshore wind turbines have been proposed for the prime fishing, rock lobster and pristine marine life area just off Pt MacDonnell in the South-East of South Australia. This is a potential disaster as the area is home to over 60 species of seabirds, significant amounts of southern bluefin tuna that regularly are 100kg plus, blue whales that migrate in this area due to the abundance of krill and the Southern Hemisphere's biggest rock lobster fishing fleet. Some public consultation has happened and there has been plenty of individuals and groups voicing their concerns including RecFish SA.

A decision hasn't been made whether the project will go ahead yet but for the sake of the pristine environment there we hope that the project will not happen.

Next year we are expecting a few changes on the ANSA SA committee. We have been running with a temporary secretary this year and the President has indicated that they may stand down.




ANSA-SA RECORDERS REPORT, 2022/2023

ANNUAL REPORT 2023

Once again it is our pleasure to present the SAFTAG Annual report for 2023.


If it is not Covid, It's a flood. Over the last few seasons there always seems to be a contributing factor to less fisher activity in some areas.

With the generational 2022-23 floods, our mighty Murray River has given our state and others upstream a well needed drink, providing difficult fishing conditions which were even at times, against government safety measures to attempt to launch a boat within.

The flip side to these floods is the fresh water with it's high nutrient loads, will provide a well needed marine food source that will enhance fish and many other biological stocks for years to come. This season is expecting to be a bumper, for fishing and SAFTAG due to this ideal conditions.

We did not see many tags go in fish for 2023, with only 503 recorded. Our recapture number of 32 is pretty similar to the last few years, with the one of the most interesting recaptures being a SAFTAG tagged Murray Cod which was detained by NSW DPI, as it was illegally taken and stowed under a boat floor by poachers after a mammoth 413km swim from lock 7 near SA border to Euston, growing 170mm over 1563 days.

With Snapper largely still not accessible with our gulfs and far west coast still closed to Snapper fishing, we have not seen a tag placed for 4 years. Consequently, Snapper's cousin, the Southern Black Bream has now passed Snapper as the most tagged species at SAFTAG with 3327 tagged. Recfish SA Citizen science taggers have been putting the bulk of these tags in, with some exciting recaptures, one of which a Bream had left the Coorong and swam into another micro estuary, 32km away at Victor Harbor. A first for SAFTAG to see a Coorong Black Bream recaptured outside of the Coorong.


